Stop and Think – Look for the dangers, always read the signs.

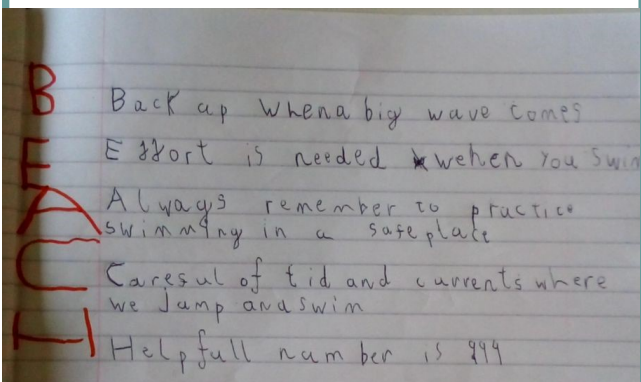
Stay Together – Never swim alone, always go with friends or family.

WOODHOUSE PRE-SCHOOL

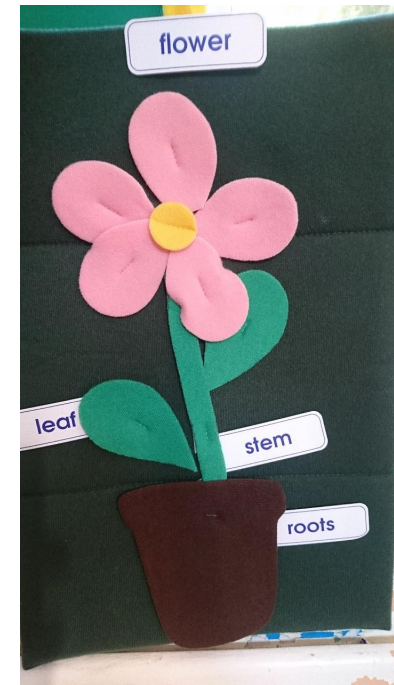
